As policing becomes increasingly intelligence-led, with neighbourhood officers conducting intelligence-informed patrols and building connections with their communities, these foundational skills are essential for everyone working on the frontline.

What you will learn

The programme covers everything you need to work with intelligence reports effectively, including:

- how to write an intelligence report?that provides clear, actionable information
- relevant laws and regulations?that govern intelligence work
- data protection and data sharing principles?to ensure you handle information appropriately
- the intelligence cycle and how your contribution fits into the bigger picture

It also includes realistic scenarios where local trainers and intelligence staff will assess your intelligence reports. The skills you will practice will be relevant throughout your career in policing.
